I want to take this opportunity to thank him for his support of, and friendship to the cottage, and to wish him well in his new assignment. He will be missed. The biggest news for this year is that the Conservancy is celebrating its twentieth anniversary of operating the cottage. A celebration will take place on June 10th during our monthly open house, and admission will be free that day. (See the news release inside this issue for details.) We opened the rehabilitated cottage for tours and rental in June of 1992, unsure of how well the cottage would be received and uncertain whether its popularity would last. It remains as popular as ever, a unique and continuing testament to the high regard with which the cottage has been held over the years and the peace and renewal that people find there. Our cottage guestbook continues to be a source of information and amusement, and that is why selections from the contents are shared in each *Writings* issue. Someone even did a detailed drawing in it a few months ago. As often happens, one anonymous person summed up the spirit of the place as well as our wish for our guests. They wrote, "I always love to come to Seth's and I always hate to leave. I'm instantly at peace upon arrival. A little cottage with a big heart and hearth, restoring humanity one visit at a time."

It is good to know that we have met our goals and dreams from over twenty years ago, so well. ☐

MIRROR LAKE STATE PARK REPORT

For the past two years the Superintendent position for the South Central Region Parks has been vacant. During this time the Bureau of Parks and Recreation has gone through some changes, re-aligning its organizational structure from five regions to four districts, which now report to the Director of State Parks.

In the late summer/early fall of 2011, the newly titled position of the Southwest District Parks and Recreation Supervisor was approved to be filled. In mid November, the position was offered to Mirror Lake State Park Superintendent Paul Zajackowski, and he accepted. He now works out of the South Central Regional Headquarters in Fitchburg. Paul has been very busy learning his new position duties, assisting with interviews and hiring for vacant positions, and visiting as many properties as he can.

In the interim, I have been appointed Acting Superintendent for the park. I am happy to say that our Superintendent position was immediately approved to be filled as well as our Park Ranger/Enforcement position. Both positions are in the hiring process and we hope to have someone in them by spring.

January brought us some wonderful snow for skiing. Our staff has spent many hours grooming the trails, and our attendance shows it. Many people have also been enjoying hiking and snowshoeing on designated trails and also in the Fern Dell Gorge. Fishing has been on and off, but they keep on trying! We had our first ice anglers on December 10th and they haven't quit yet. Late January brought the first vehicles driven on the ice for the season.

The Friends Group and Park Staff hosted the January Candlelight Event. We did not have any snow, but that did not stop approximately 700 people from joining us for a beautiful hike under a clear sky lit by the full moon!

The Annual Delton Sportsmen's Club's Mirror Lake Fisheree was held on January 15th. Attendance was down, because of thinner-than-normal ice conditions. But that did not stop fishermen from catching fish! ☐

20 YEARS LIVING WRIGHT: A CELEBRATION OF THE SETH PETERSON COTTAGE

The Seth Peterson Cottage on Mirror Lake will celebrate the Twentieth Anniversary of its restoration on Sunday, June 10th, from 1-3:30 PM. The fun begins with a free open house, guided tours, music, and cake, with a special program at 2:30 PM. There will be a drawing for a free night's stay at the cottage.

The Seth Peterson Cottage was the first Wright building made available for vacation rental. In the past twenty years, the cottage has welcomed more than 15,000 overnight guests, coming from most U.S. states and many foreign countries, with the most distant visitor from Perth, Australia. Overnight rental and open houses on the second Sunday of each month attract more than a thousand visitors annually. The cottage continues to draw attention with feature articles in *The New York Times*, *National Geographic Traveler*, *Architectural Digest*, and *The Chicago Tribune*.

Seth Peterson was a Wisconsin native with a lifelong interest in Wright. In 1958 he convinced the 90-year-old master architect to design the cottage, but Peterson suffered an untimely death before it was finished. The cottage was then bought and completed by others. In 1966, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources acquired the property when the land was added to Mirror Lake State Park. The cottage sat boarded and abandoned until 1989 when concerned Mirror Lake residents and Wright devotees formed a non-profit organization, The Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy, to save and restore the cottage as Frank Lloyd Wright envisioned it, and to give it a new and useful life. The award-winning three-year, \$300,000 rehabilitation project was completed in 1992.

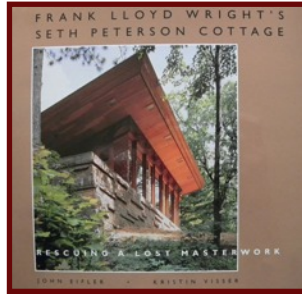

RESCUING A LOST MASTERWORK: THE REHABILITATION

This is the eleventh in a series of excerpts from the book, Frank Lloyd Wright's Seth Peterson Cottage: Rescuing a Lost Masterwork, by John Eifler, AIA, and Kristin Visser. It is the definitive story of the cottage. The previous excerpt described the first steps in rescue—the “deconstruction” of the cottage, which necessarily preceded its reconstruction. In today's excerpt, we begin with the roof.



Wright always attached significance to the type of roof chosen for his houses. As the cottage was a small commission, Wright probably tried to keep costs down by using forms that had proven less costly in the past. In *The Natural House* he states:

“Now the shape of roof—whether a shed roof, a hip roof or a flat roof—depends in part on expediency and in part on your personal taste or knowledge as to what is appropriate in the circumstances. One of the advantages of the sloping roof is that it gives you a sense of spaciousness inside, a sense of overhead uplift which I often feel to be very good. The flat roof also has advantages in construction. It is easy to do, of course. . . . The cheapest roof, however, is the shed roof—the roof sloping one way, more or less. There you get more for your money than you can get from any other form of roof. . . . But the type of roof you choose must not only deal with the elements in your region but be appropriate to the circumstances, according to your personal preference. . . .”

Though the cottage has been described as a “building all under one roof,” the roof is, in fact, very complex. It is comprised of a large sloping shed roof and two levels of flat roof, an upper one above the kitchen and bathroom/storage loft, and another over the bedroom and the rear of the living room. The flat roof over the kitchen has parapet walls, while the roof over the living room and bedroom has large overhangs in some areas and parapet walls in others.

. . . The roof was designed to allow water to flow off the living room shed roof and onto the flat roof segment that extends over the bedroom and the rear of the living room. John [Eifler] found that the flat roof was installed perfectly level, and over time the structure had deflected, creating depressions in which water pooled, and which eventually leaked. This lack of proper drainage was inconsistent with Wright's intentions.

. . . The rehabilitation plan called for two improvements to correct this problem. First, a scupper was added at the living room parapet wall to provide a direct path for water to flow off the roof. Second, the plywood sheathing for the flat roof areas was placed on a series of tapered furring strips attached directly to the flat roof framing to ensure a very slight pitch as Wright recommended. Water drains from the bedroom flat roof through three copper-pipe roof drains that allow the water to fall clear of the exterior wall. Bronze drip chains were added to reduce splashing when the water hits the ground and to encourage the formation of icicles. □

PETERSON PASSION—THE EXPERIENCE OF BEING A TOUR GUIDE

Imagine a group of people listening with rapt attention as you describe the reason for the “destruction of the box.” I was amazed and pleased the first time it actually happened to me. Who knew I could be a tour guide? Before that moment, I certainly had no idea.

As a social worker for twenty-some years, I had plenty of practice talking to people individually or in small family groups. But to describe the historical importance of the architecture of Frank Lloyd Wright seemed a bit out of my realm.

I found that most of the people who visit the cottage are interested in the architecture and the history of the building. They are engaged in the tour and often bring Frank Lloyd Wright stories of their own.

Over time I gained more knowledge from listening to the insights and experiences of other members involved from the beginning in the Cottage Conservancy. My comfort level and enjoyment has grown through my years as a tour guide. The investment of my time is not large, as the cottage offers tours only one Sunday a month. I can choose which months I want to volunteer. The ability to help people understand a piece of history is well worth the investment of a Sunday afternoon in the woods. I feel privileged to learn and share my knowledge with people eager to understand Mr. Wright's Architecture.
